Personal Recruiting

Find new ways to talk about barbershop every day. Find ways to mention barbershop harmony to every person you meet, every one!

A. Committing to Try

- Set a personal goal: Today, I will mention barbershop harmony to 5 people, no matter what it takes.
- Dial a wrong number: "Oops, I'm sorry! I was calling (Ken A. Wright) about our barbershop chorus...Say, do you know anyone who likes to sing? Have you heard of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America, Inc?
- Wear your SPEBSQSA lapel pin.
- Wear a ridiculous button. The more outrageous, the better. When they ask ... hook 'em! Examples: "Will sing baritone for food." "Basses hit the bottom." "They'll get my pitch pipe when they pry it out of my cold lifeless hand." "HIT ME ... or sing with me." "Show me your tessiture (Your vocal range)."
- See who in your chapter or family can come up with the best slogan and make one for everyone in your chapter.

B. Committing to Ask

- Call your cousin or your next door neighbor and ask him if he likes to sing. Extend your nuclear family.
- Call your college roommate and send him to the nearest barbershop chapter. You'll get Man of Note credit for him.
- After the national anthem at the ballgame, tell the guy in the next row that he has a good voice. Ask him to come sing with your chapter.
- Play barbershop music at work, or when you are on the phone. Interrupt yourself to say. "Oh wait a second, this is the good part! Turn up the music. Ask the caller if they like to sing.
- Play barbershop music loud in your car in the parking lot. Sing along. When other drivers give you funny looks, ask them if they like to sing

C. Committing to Promote

- Post announcements on electronic bulletin boards. Add the title Barbershop Singer to your email signature.
- Ask for barbershop music at the record store. If they don't have it, refer them to http://www.harmonymarketplace.com
- Whistle while you work. Someone will ask, "Why are you always whistling?" Explain to them how much music means to you. Ask them if they know anyone else who likes a capella music.
- Call radio talk shows. When the host asks, "What are you doing?" Tell him you are working on music for your chorus/quartet rehearsal tonight. Invite folks interested in singing to come hear your rehearsal.

What is the Regional Assessment Fee and Why is it Going up on May 1, 2018?

- What's Up? On May 1, 2018, your Annual Regional Assessment Fee will be increasing by \$10.
- What does that mean for you? For regular members, your fees will go from \$40 to \$50 per member and for Youth Members (aged 25 and under), the fee will increase to \$25 per member.
- Where do the funds go? The Regional Assessment received from each member goes right into the general fund, and is used to support educational opportunities together with operating expenses that support our membership. Using our 5-year education plan, we will continue to invest in the musical and leadership future of Canadian Maple Leaf Region 26.
- Why are the fees increasing? We had been able to avoid an increase since 2009, but as we are all aware, costs keep climbing for goods and services. Another factor in our decision is that membership numbers in the Region have been gradually declining, not alarmingly so, but it is happening.

GREAT EDUCATION CLASS



If You Sing, They Will Come Embracing Barbershop

It is January, Region 26, and a new year awaits us. For many of our choruses, January is a time for reflection and planning, and those plans often focus on attracting new members.

"It is no surprise to any of us that we are an 'aging' population," said Sweet Adelines Intl. President, Paula Davis, earlier this month.

Over the past 20 years, the membership in our organization has been declining. Since 1998, memberships have fallen by approximately 8,000. It is important that all of us work together to build our membership. But what does that look like, and how do we do it?

I don't have the answer to that, but I have noticed that the first thing we ask ourselves is: "Why are we losing members?" Often, the first thing we come up with is: "Because the younger generation isn't interested in barbershop."

But that is simply not true.

I joined Sweet Adelines when I was 22 years old and I was, by far, the youngest member in the chorus. But my age, and the ages of the other members, didn't matter. Upon joining the organization, I found myself surrounded by hardworking, passionate, welcoming and friendly women. The age difference just didn't bother me; in fact, I loved it. I had the opportunity to learn from women who had been singing barbershop for many years. There were mentors and teachers all around me.

Emily Froese, a university student and 3-year member with Lions Gate Chorus felt the same way as I did. "Right when you join you suddenly have 100 new best friends and family. Before [joining the chorus], I mostly talked to people my own age, but now... age doesn't matter," says Emily. "The music brings everyone closer together – we're united by it."

Like Emily, I fell in love with barbershop harmonies immediately. No one had to convince me that it was "cool". I just knew that it was. But let's be honest: "cool" probably isn't the best way to describe barbershop music. Let's not deny who we are and what we do.

Barbershop is old-fashioned. It's technically challenging and it's a musical niche. Ladies, barbershop singing is totally "hipster". What makes our choruses and quartets so amazing is that we are unapologetically nerdy and passionate about our hobby in the best possible way. Sure, we love to sing pop music and non-barbershop tunes too, but at the end of the day, we sing, live, and breathe barbershop. And we love it.

"I think what ties us together is a shared quest for excellence that I haven't seen at a regular community choir or chorus," says Meghan Fell, an 11-year member with Lions Gate Chorus.

For more than 25 years, Lions Gate Chorus has had more than 60 members. When Meghan saw Lions Gate Chorus for the first time, she was struck by the performance. "They looked like they were having so much fun and I wanted to be a part of it."

Authenticity is what draws in audiences and attracts new members.

We can't just become something "new" in order to appeal to young women. We can not lose sight of our collective and individual chorus visions and missions in an attempt to be more modern. Of course, we are an ever-evolving organization, but we were founded on this particular style of music that brings joy to each and every Sweet Adelines member.

The best thing we can do is teach our new members everything there is to learn about barbershop music, while continuing to be a welcoming, friendly, and inclusive organization.

Barbershop is the heart of who we are. It's the beacon that draws in music lovers and it's the glue that keeps us together.

No matter what drives you, there is a place for you

About 10 years ago, I was in a women's fitness center when I saw a poster inviting women who like to sing to a chorus rehearsal and free singing lesson. I had been singing from a young age; had received formal training from some pretty amazing teachers; had experience in many genres; and used my gift at my place of worship. This poster spoke to the lifelong learner in me. FREE SINGING LESSON.

A step or a leap...

Many of us do not step quickly into unknown situations. I usually research before I take a leap into something... I did no research. I didn't know what kind of music I would be singing, if this was a co-ed situation, or if I'd have to dust off my shaky music reading skills... all I knew was I wanted that free singing lesson. So, I walked into a room of about 20 women singing 4-part a cappella harmony.

Hook, line, sinker...

I was placed as a tenor and was buddied with another tenor on the risers so that I could listen, learn, and not be alone in the vocal stratosphere. I began to engage and be engaged.

I honestly don't remember if there were voice lessons in a one-on-one setting as I expected, but I do know that the level of learning on the risers fed me. The director was knowledgeable and the entire rehearsal was about improvement, not just practice. I was hooked – not on barbershop yet, but on personal vocal growth.

It's in the DNA...

All Sweet Adeline Choruses share the same DNA. We have similar models of chirus governance; the same requirements to maintain chapter status; and we belong to an organization that exists to advance barbershop harmony through education, performance and competition.

There are small choruses and large choruses. Some compete at the regional level to maintain good standing and others to vie for a place on the international competition stage. Some choruses are driven by the opportunity to sing for fun and personal recreation and others that are fueled by the commitment and expectations required to be counted among the top choruses in the world.

My happy place...

I now have a new chorus family. In this past year I have experienced so much that feeds me and drives me and makes me so very excited; more difficult music; higher expectations; life-changing vocal coaching; world-class instruction and direction; an amazingly accomplished leadership team; and an unforgettable pinnacle week at International competition. I have been given responsibilities and the opportunity to be mentored in leadership. I have found my happy place.

There's a chorus for that...

No matter your personality, your vocal experience, your schedule, your self-confidence, shape, colour, or size – no matter what you believe, or who you love, there is a chorus for you.

No matter your reason, whether to sing, work hard, become a leader, or find a safe place with women who care about you... there's a chorus for that. Whether or not you love the style of music, what Sweet Adeline choruses offer transcends style.

I'd say we can use a little more love, laughter, friendship and purpose in our lives. **Yes, there's a chorus for that!**

Magic City Chorus, Saskatoon




Each prospective and chartered chorus is encouraged to honour an individual who contributes to your chorus "over and above" or who is due special recognition to be celebrated by our entire Region.
